Brethren,



From the South Brothers,



Freemasonry and Modern Culture

Sandy Valley #57 Monthly Masonic Education Lecture

What is the aim of freemasonry in an era of instability and confrontation as the one we live in? Freemasonry has been persistent in transmitting to society the values that explained its creation, as a speculative fraternity, three hundred years ago. They are brotherly love, truth and charity.

- By brotherly love, we mean that men beyond everything that divide them
 have the same nature, the same appeal of in rationality. If the essence is the
 same there is no reason why men would not cooperate to improve their lives
 and make society a better place to live.
- By truth, we intend that beyond every conception of religion and philosophy, man look to be truthful to himself and have a secure and happy life. It is the pursuit of happiness that is embedded in the Declaration of Independence of the United States and that our American Brethren inherited from the European Enlightenment philosophers.
- By charity or relief, we mean that we have a core duty to assist the less fortunate, the poor and the disadvantaged. The asymmetry of wealth distribution is larger today than in previous decades. The rich people are richer and the poor poorer. Freemasonry has a role to play by assisting charitable initiatives and helping those in need, being them orphans, old people, people who suffer from severe illnesses.

Freemasonry aims to transform men and make them better human beings and responsible citizens. It throughout that procession of transformation that starts with the Initiation and continues with the works inside the Lodge that the level of humanness is increased and the social responsibility enhanced. This is our trace of distinctiveness. The society cannot be improved without focus on the individual; transformation starts within one man and only after can be transferred to the society as a whole.

FROM THE CENTERS FOR DISEASE CONTROL AND PREVENTION RE: COVID-19:

KNOW HOW IT SPREADS

- There is currently no vaccine to prevent coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19).
- The best way to prevent illness is to avoid being exposed to this virus.
- The virus is thought to spread mainly from person-to-person.
- Between people who are in close contact with one another (within about 6 feet).
- Through respiratory droplets produced when an infected person coughs or sneezes.
- These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby or possibly be inhaled into the lungs.

TAKE STEPS TO PROTECT YOURSELF

- Illustration: washing hands with soap and water
- Clean your hands often
- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds especially
 after you have been in a public place, or after blowing your nose, coughing,
 or sneezing.
- If soap and water are not readily available, use a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol. Cover all surfaces of your hands and rub them together until they feel dry.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.

AVOID CLOSE CONTACT

- Avoid close contact with people who are sick
- Put distance between yourself and other people if COVID-19 is spreading in your community. This is especially important for people who are at higher risk of getting very sick.

TAKE STEPS TO PROTECT OTHERS

- Stay home if you are sick, except to get medical care. Learn what to do if you
 are sick.
- Cover coughs and sneezes
 - Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when you cough or sneeze or use the inside of your elbow.
 - Throw used tissues in the trash.

- o Immediately wash your hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not readily available, clean your hands with a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol.
- Wear a facemask if you are sick
 - If you are sick: You should wear a facemask when you are around other people (e.g., sharing a room or vehicle) and before you enter a healthcare provider's office. If you are not able to wear a facemask (for example, because it causes trouble breathing), then you should do your best to cover your coughs and sneezes, and people who are caring for you should wear a facemask if they enter your room. Learn what to do if you are sick.
 - If you are NOT sick: You do not need to wear a facemask unless you are caring for someone who is sick (and they are not able to wear a facemask). Facemasks may be in short supply and they should be saved for caregivers.
- Clean and disinfect
 - Clean AND disinfect frequently touched surfaces daily. This includes tables, doorknobs, light switches, countertops, handles, desks, phones, keyboards, toilets, faucets, and sinks.
 - If surfaces are dirty, clean them: Use detergent or soap and water prior to disinfection.


